

# Mozambique's Experience In Building A National Extension System

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papers presented at the national seminar on alternative extension approaches in technology transfer held at trivandrum during 21 22 february 2004

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investing to promote agricultural growth and poverty reduction is a central pillar of the world bank s current rural strategy reaching the rural poor 2003 this sourcebook addresses how to implement the rural strategy by sharing information on investment options and identifying innovative approaches that will aid the design of future lending programs for agriculture it provides generic good practices and many examples that demonstrate investment in agriculture can provide rewarding and sustainable returns to development efforts it is divided into eleven self contained modules each module contains three different types of subunits that can also be stand alone documents i module overview ii agricultural investment notes iii innovative activity profiles the stand alone nature of the subunits allows flexibility and adaptability of the material selected readings and web links are also provided for readers who seek more in depth information the sourcebook draws on a wide range of experiences from donor agencies governments institutions and other groups active

in agricultural development it is an invaluable reference tool for policy makers professionals academics and students and anyone with an interest in agricultural investments

the aim of nigeria's extension reform and transformation agenda through its new national extension policy nep is to put in place a legislated pluralistic farmer responsive and market oriented extension system the reformed extension system aims at an assured and regular source of funding and a well trained and motivated staff effectively catering for a variety of actors along targeted value chains it also aims at effective integration of the complex innovation processes in the agricultural and food system transformation in nigeria implementation of the nep at the state level remains a major challenge this paper documents issues challenges constraints and potential solutions and opportunities in implementing nep at the state level using niger state as a case study we use a qualitative method in the context of inclusive consultative process with a focus on the multi stakeholder participatory model we found that strengthening actors capacities for innovation by considering the complexity of agricultural innovation system is very critical to effective and successful implementation of national agricultural policies in niger state we confirm from our study that networking partnership facilitation and collaboration functions are crucial cross cutting measures across the agricultural innovation system for operative and systematic implementation of the nep in niger state based on our findings in niger state even if we make effort to draw generic lessons for nigeria the case studies show that understanding the dynamics of efficiently and productively implementing the national extension policy remain case specific and no silver bullet can be provided to support agricultural innovation system due to the complex federal governance system in nigeria therefore a state level or case specific is highly recommended for operational implementation process in nigeria

this paper traces the evolution of world bank support to agricultural services particularly agricultural extension and research in sub saharan africa it describes the bank's experience with the implementation of national programs in agricultural extension and research and how these are evolving to face the problems of the future the paper concludes that participation of the beneficiaries in the design and implementation of programs is critical and will ensure the programs convergence towards rural development

this book uses a historical and modern lens to reimagine the role that extension could potentially play in catalyzing reciprocal co learning relationships between land grant universities and their diverse local constituencies the establishment of statewide extension systems was once seen as a way to ensure that land grant universities would be accessible and responsive to all of a state s residents extension systems continue to offer a front door to a major public university in almost every county of the united states but they tend to be viewed primarily as a way to translate science or distribute information from the university to the public this books argues for the importance of extension and shows that we are conceiving of this system too narrowly only by retelling the stories of the extension and getting people to see themselves as part of the story can we imagine a different future in which state universities and land grant colleges engage more authentically and equitably in two way relationships with their local constituents in catalyzing reciprocal co learning relationships between land grant universities and their diverse local constituencies chapter palatable disruption the politics of plant milk chapter feeding the melting pot inclusive strategies for the multi ethnic city chapter a carrot isn t a carrot isn t a carrot tracing value in alternative practices of food exchange chapter virtualizing the good life reworking narratives of agrarianism and the rural idyll in a computer game and chapter workable utopias for social change through inclusion and empowerment community supported agriculture csa in wales as social innovation are available open access under a creative commons attribution 4 0 international license via link springer com

agricultural extension plays a number of important roles in the growth and transformation of the agricultural sector including improving agricultural productivity and food security and reducing hunger and malnutrition extension programs and interventions that will achieve significant impacts in terms of behavior and practice changes as well as agricultural productivity increase will succeed as a result of suitable policy formulation and an effective implementation process ultimately agricultural extension reform requires policy vision and determination and a state level strategy that can be implemented this paper documents issues challenges constraints and potential solutions and opportunities in implementing the national extension policy nep at the state level in nigeria using cross river state as a case study we use both quantitative and qualitative methods in the form of descriptive statistical analysis and an inclusive consultative process with a focus on the multistakeholder participatory model respectively the descriptive results show that generally there is low access to agricultural extension service across commodities and their respective values chains in cross river state we also document interesting insights from the multistakeholder consultative process we find that collaboration and partnership between private and public extension service providers is key to developing a sustainable extension advisory and support service in cross river state we also found that coordination and

standardization of the activities of the extension service providers is a way to avoid pollution of the agricultural innovation system in the state funding of extension services is another important factor affecting the effective implementation of the nep we therefore suggest that agricultural extension services can be funded through decentralization involvement of farmers associations and nongovernmental organizations contracting out of extension services public private partnerships privatization and embedding advisory services in other types of contracts the results of this study further validate our approach of using multistakeholder engagement at the state level as an effective and insightful method of implementing the nep at the state level

investing in farmers or agriculture human capital is crucial to addressing challenges in our agri food systems a global study carried out by the fao investment centre and the international food policy research institute with support from the cgiar research programme on policies institutions and markets and the fao research and extension unit looks at agriculture human capital investments from trends to promising initiatives one of the nine featured case studies is the twigire muhinzi national extension system in rwanda twigire muhinzi is the government s homegrown decentralized and farmer oriented national system based on two complementary types of farmer to farmer extension approaches farmer promoters and farmer field schools the model showcases how an extension approach can improve farmer skills knowledge and empowerment and thus lead to enhanced adoption of relevant technologies and practices in rwanda mainstreaming the farmer field school approach into the national extension system along with financial support from public private partnerships contributed to its scaling up this publication is part of the country investment highlights series under the fao investment centre s knowledge for investment k4i programme

this book on improving agricultural extension a reference manual offers a critical review and inventory analysis of the state of the art in agricultural extension theory and best practices written by internationally known agricultural extension practitioners educators and scholars a total of 38 authors from 15 countries contributed to the 23 chapters of this book and thus they provided broad international perspectives covering both theory and practice as well as micro and macro issues related to agricultural extension it is the third edition of a classic reference manual on agricultural extension published by the food and agriculture organization fao of the united nations aimed at agricultural extension planners managers trainers educators and field practitioners this book could be useful in improving the quality of agricultural extension and in generating new ideas and methods for increasing further the cost effectiveness of agricultural extension programmes it provides many sound and practical suggestions for developing and improving the conceptual

technical and operational methods and tools in order to strategically plan efficiently manage and scientifically evaluate a problem solving demand driven and needs based agricultural extension programmes

there are more than 120 organizations and programs in malawi working on agriculture that include extension service provision among their main activities however extension service provision is largely projectized uncoordinated and unmonitored this note synthesizes the main findings from the recent surveys and interviews of households communities and service providers about the status of access to these extension services challenges on both demand and supply sides and suggestions and reflections that can inform the ongoing development of the national agricultural extension strategy

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
